











Election Day Newspaper Scavenger Hunt

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Prior to Election Day:

- 1. Make a chart listing all candidates including their political party affiliation and office they are running for. Notate if the candidate is an incumbent (now in office) or an opponent (seeking office).
- 2. Make a list of any constitutional amendments that will be voted on. Write a brief description of each amendment, based on information from newspaper articles.
- 3. Based on the information you've gathered, make a decision of how you would vote on the amendments and candidates. Conduct a mock election in your classroom. Don't look at the results until after the election.

On Election Day:

- 1. Read Election Day articles and news stories. Note any comments on the election process, candidates, or voting issues in today's paper.
- 2. Make a list of ads featuring Election Day sales or promotions.
- 3. Make a list of any comic strips that mention Election Day.
- 4. Plan a celebration party for the winning candidates using newspaper ads. Include location, who would be invited, what food would be served or catered, etc.

Following Election Day:

- 1. Read the election results. Compare them with the results of your classroom election. Hold a classroom discussion on the results of both elections.
- 2. Write letters congratulating the winning candidates and consoling the losing candidates.
- 3. Read the opinion comments again. How many people are pleased with the voting outcome? How many are upset?
- 4. Compile a log of future newspaper articles featuring the outcome of this election including activities of the winning candidate and results of the passed amendments.

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
